"I just wanted to give you an update on Boogie. He is doing great! We are using ASL (American Sign Language) to communicate with him, he responds very well. His favorite nap time place is on his big brother's bed under his blanket with his toys, lol. He made himself right at home from day one. He is a big momma's boy! He is doing great with potty training, no accidents. He loves meal time and waits patiently while we fix his bowl. He also loves trips to PetSmart to pick out his own toys. Feline Leukemia Cats

Eli and Raider are two cats with feline leukemia but they are two of the coolest cats. They were in a foster home as kittens with Liz Dille. "Raider and Eli are always so excited to see their humans and love to play fetch and will give kisses. Raider's tail has its own personality and he is always available for a cuddle."

Feline leukemia is often a death sentence in shelters. It is a contagious virus and is passed to other cats primarily through saliva. Even though these FeLV cats have weaker immune systems, they can live fulfilling, happy, and long lives just like any other cat. Often, they live their lives without developing any of the virus's harmful symptoms.

One Saturday, these sweet babies were adopted to assist at a rehab facility. Eli and Raider are now happily comforting people that are healing and bettering themselves. We like to think of them as service kitties!

We called foster mom Jackie Stolarski. She said she would help, but 18 people were arriving shortly for a dinner party. A kind volunteer, Jessica, drove over, gave these puppies a bottle, and drove them to Jackie's house.

"Our guests stepped up and everybody took a puppy and a bottle, and it was a different kind of party activity. A few pups were in pretty bad shape, so it was a little sad, but I assure you they were loved."

Reaching Our Seniors
